

GENA2322A General History of China (in English) [中國通史]

2nd Term, 2017-18 (Fridays 1:30 – 3:15 pm at NAH213)

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This course examines the development of the major Chinese schools of thoughts, such as Confucianism, Taoism, and Legalism (pendulum cycle) as well as the main themes and events in Chinese history. The course also examines the greatness of Han and Tang as well as the dynastic imperial China and modern/20th century China (from ancient to modern).

Learning Outcomes:

By the end of the course, students will be able to:

1. Comprehend the Chinese thought, especially Confucianism, Taoism, and Legalism;
2. Understand the development and main themes in Chinese history;
3. Arouse the students' interests in Chinese history and culture.
